Letter from the Clergy

Dear Readers

HAPPY NEW YEAR!

Welcome to the first magazine of not only a new year but a new decade. In the closing days of 2019 the latest fad on Facebook was called 'The 10 year challenge'. People were posting photographs of themselves taken in 2009 and alongside it another of them taken in 2019 so that they could see



how they had changed over the decade. I searched through my photos and, when I saw the difference 10 years had made, decided I wouldn't bother to join in. We live with constant change and it isn't always for the better!

However, when a new year comes and perhaps particularly when we begin a new decade, we look at ourselves and think about the changes we would like to make as we look ahead to the next ten years. It's often to do with our appearance and well-being - we would like to be thinner/fitter/healthier/spend less/save more/try a new activity/join a new group. Perhaps we would like to be kinder, more compassionate, more helpful.

One change that we hear about a lot is climate change and we have been made more aware of that in recent weeks as we see reports of the Australian fires and the terrible effects on the lives of the people and wildlife. These words from the hymn 'Abide with me' may be familiar to you:

'change and decay in all around I see;

O, thou who changest not, abide with me.'





I am delighted that, despite the financial pressures we faced, our churches still supported a large number of charities in 2019:

- Both churches collect food for the Newcastle West End foodbank
- The young people held a sponsored sleep out in February 2019 that raised money for the homeless charity Changing Lives
- We gave new clothes to the People's Kitchen
- Once a month we hold a collection at St Mary's for Tear Fund
- We collected for the Children's Society at our Christingle service
- Collections at our Christmas services raised significant sums of money for the West End Refugee Service and the People's Kitchen
- Money was raised through the soup and a bun for the RVI children's cancer ward

We also have members of our congregations who support charities by giving as individuals and by working for the charities: for example, as 'Street Pastors'.

The total amount of money that we raised for charities during the year was greater than the sum that was raised for the church through the Christmas fair.

Thank you for your support; we hope and pray that we can again both meet the costs of the church, and raise money for good causes, in 2020.

Thank you!

I want to say a big thank you to everyone who helped to run, or came along to, the Christmas fair. There was a great buzz about the place as we set up on the Friday and then again during the fair on the Saturday. We really enjoyed seeing so many people come along and take part. The quality of prizes on all of the stalls demonstrated the value that everybody puts on this occasion.



One purpose of the fair is to invite the community in and to meet with people, which is why we are so keen that people take time to have some refreshments and a chat. Another purpose is to raise money for the church – I am delighted that we raised over £1800. This money is urgently needed, because the church is in a challenging financial position, both nationally and locally. The church of England (like all other Christian and other faith groups) receives no money from the government and must raise the money itself to cover the cost of maintaining church buildings and vicarages, paying clergy and meeting all other expenses. In the past, it has had considerable sums of capital to draw on, but these sums of money have dwindled with time, and now it must meet its costs largely through the giving of its members. There is a national scheme whereby the wealthier churches subsidise the less wealthy ones but we at Newburn Parish must raise approximately £60,000 per year if the churches are to remain open for regular worship as well as baptisms, weddings, funerals and other community activities. That we are able to do this is due to the generosity and sacrificial giving of our members, many of who are on low incomes, and to fundraising activities, of which the Christmas fair is the most significant.



25 February – Shrove Tuesday: Who's for pancakes?

Why do we have pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, or Pancake Day, as we call it today? And what is Shrove Tuesday? And why do thousands of people feel it rewarding to race along a street somewhere tossing pancakes from their frying pans as they go?

Well, the answer to the first question is that it is the day before Lent begins and for well over a thousand years that has meant it was the last chance to enjoy meat, fat and other tasty dishes until Easter Day. The 'Lent Fast' was widely and strictly observed. The food in the larder wouldn't keep for six weeks so it had to be eaten. With all these rich foods no wonder the French call it 'Fatty Tuesday' – Mardi Gras.

So, what have pancake races got to do with all this solemnity? 'Shrove' is an old word for 'forgiven' and in those days to prepare for the rigours of Lent people would want to confess and seek forgiveness – not quite what you want at a party. The answer is quite simply enjoying yourself while you can! So, on Shrove Tuesday this year let's have some fun and make it last as long as possible.

The most convincing (and amusing) of the explanations of pancake races is of outwitting the Sexton who rang the curfew bell that marked the start of Lent. He was reluctant to do it while the race was unfinished. So, the revelry caused by dropped pancakes, postponed the inevitable.

Since the Reformation it has not been so rigorously observed in Britain, but still people will resolve to 'give up something for Lent'. Six weeks is about right as a duration and Sunday has always been exempt but make the most of those pancakes. They may well not reappear until April 12th!
